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*Migrations, power and the human body. Nuno Silas' Joni: Portrait of Mozambican Miners and Families in South Africa Revisited*

### **Abstract**

The history of labour migration of Mozambicans to South Africa began in the 1800s; at that time, Mozambique was a Portuguese colony. The article presents a body of artwork by Nuno Silas related to migratory communities to South Africa. It combines past and present historical tensions between migration, power, political instability, and the human body as social history. *Joni* is an experimental art installation that includes sounds and photographs on a large scale. In the project, Nuno Silas examines stories of the everyday life of Mozambican miners under Apartheid and during the Mozambique revolution to post-independence. Escaping from compulsory recruitment for the army carried out by the Mozambican Armed Forces, people left their country searching for a triumph of life in neighbour South Africa. Using family documents and narratives, the installation brings a complex interpretation of the power of documentary photography developed at that time (the 1960s). The piece also includes sound by Fany Pfumo and Francisco Mahecuane, Moda Xicavalo and Makwayela dance - the traditional dance deeply rooted in the south of Mozambique established by the miner worker, which explores the experience of Mozambicans in South Africa.
